Land of the Free

Flags, fireworks, picnics...Independence Day (the 4th of July) is celebrated each year as the birthday of the United States of America. Do you know why?

It was on July 4, 1776, that the Continental Congress approved a written document we call the Declaration of Independence. This document declared that the British colonies in

North America had the right to be their own nation, no longer under the rule of the King of Great Britain. This declaration led to war, as many feared it would; yet the Revolutionary War helped to establish the freedoms that we enjoy in this land today.

Approving the Declaration made it official even though it wasn't signed until almost a month later.

Don't forget, this was in the days before computers. The draft document was too rough and marked with corrections, so Congress had a new copy made. This copy was to be written in a fancy style and without errors or corrections, on parchment (which lasted longer than other kinds of paper). Naturally, this took some time. The official document was actually signed on August 2nd.

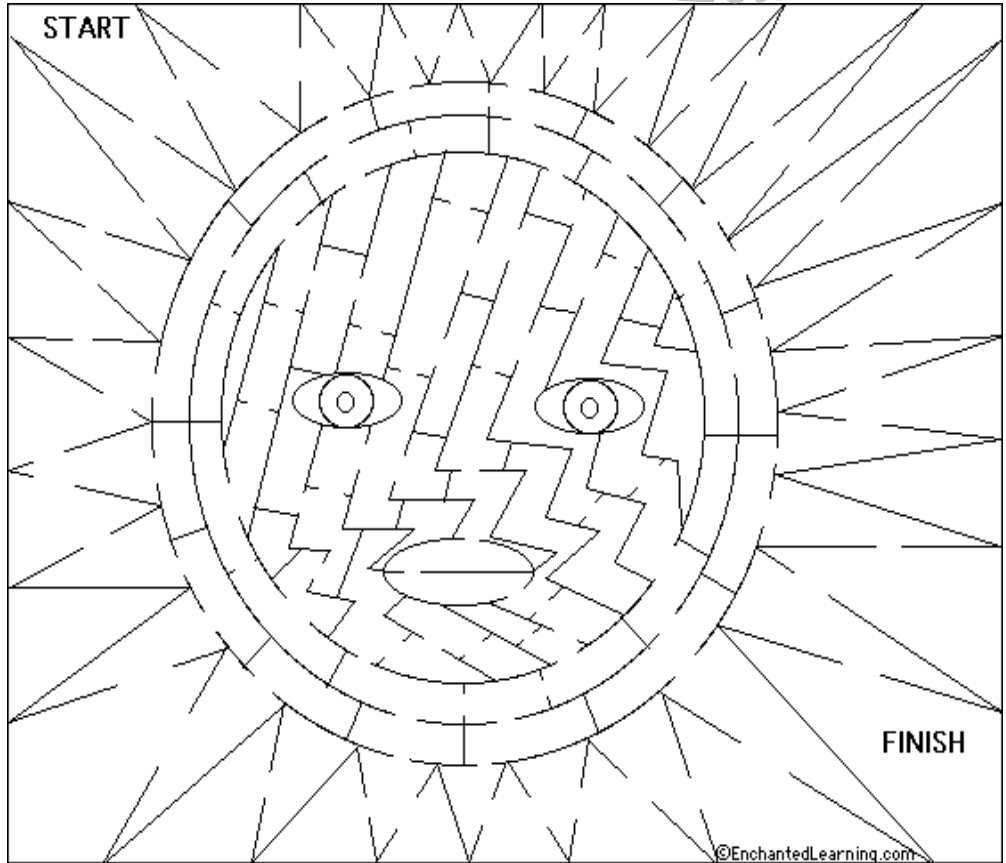

Coming Soon To a Coin Near You!

The United States is honoring our Nation's presidents by issuing \$1 circulating coins featuring their images in the order that they served, beginning with Presidents Washington, Adams, Jefferson and Madison in 2007. The United States Mint will mint and issue four Presidential \$1 Coins per year, and each will feature a striking rendition of the Statue of Liberty on the reverse side. These coins will feature larger, more dramatic artwork, as well as inscriptions on the edge of the year of minting or issuance, "E Pluribus Unum," "In God We Trust" and the mint mark.

Although the size, weight and metal composition of the new Presidential \$1 Coin will be identical to that of the Sacagawea Golden Dollar, there are several unique features that make this coin distinctive.

The Presidential \$1 Coin Program will run for about 10 years beginning in 2007. It honors all the past Presidents of the United States who have been dead for at least two years, in the order in which they served in office. Circulating beside the Sacagawea dollar coin, four new Presidential \$1 coins will be struck every year.

For each President, the front of the coin will feature the

President's portrait, name, and years the President's term began and ended. An image of the Statue of Liberty will appear on the back of each coin. For this program, the law calls for an image of the Statue of Liberty to stand for the idea of liberty. People all over the world know the Statue of Liberty as a symbol of liberty and freedom in the United States. In 1886, President Grover Cleveland accepted the Statue of Liberty from France and said, "We will not forget that Liberty has here made her home."
